MUC 4241 Music Composition Seminar V Section I MBUS 439 Wednesdays 2:30 – 3:30 PM

Description/Objectives/Learning Outcomes:

This course is designed to provide the students with continued opportunities to further develop and refine their compositional craft and aesthetic concerns. *Upper level composition (III-VI) is a continuation of the composition sequence and can only be taken by students who have been accepted into the composition program*. It is expected that students will gain additional compositional tools and techniques as they create new works with the guidance of the instructor in each of these upper level courses. Each semester students will continue to develop and augment their upper level portfolio of compositions as they work towards their senior recital. It is expected that the student's works will demonstrate additional skills as they move through the sequence of courses.

Recommended Texts:

Cope, David. *Techniques of the Contemporary Composer*. New York: Schirmer Books. Additional texts and/or anthologies may be suggested during each semester; In addition, there may be internet sites and YouTube and Vimeo links provided for additional information. All students are expected to use appropriate notation software (Sibelius, Finale) for their work in the course.

Materials to be covered will include:

- (1) the continued analysis of the techniques utilized in 21st century Art music (which may include everything from the language of Gregorian Chant to 19th century Romantic works);
- (2) the implications of different aesthetic viewpoints in composition and the syntax of music;
- (3) additional topics which will arise as each student works on developing their musical craft and personal compositional approach;

Projects and Assignments:

The format of the class is private lessons with a one 1 hour meeting per week. Students are expected to complete 10 minutes of acceptable music during the semester as approved by the instructor as they work towards their Senior Music Composition recital. The 10-minutes can be in the form of one composition or multiple shorter compositions to be discussed and decided with the instructor and should be completed before final exam week. The acceptability/approval of the work will be made by the instructor based on the appropriate use of compositional techniques, aesthetic considerations, innovation and craftsmanship, and calligraphy and notation as exhibited by the work being created by the student.

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From time to time additional short writing/analysis exercises may also be required. Compositions will count 100% of the grade however unexcused absences and/or lateness from private lessons may result in a lowering of the final grade at the discretion of the instructor.

Please note that students at this level are expected to do A work. Less than A work may result in probation and possible expulsion from the program at the discretion of the composition faculty. Two consecutive semesters of less than B work will result in an automatic expulsion from the composition area.

Composition Juries:

All composition students must present their works to the composition faculty at a composition jury to be held at the end of the semester during finals week. The faculty will critique the student's works from the semester making recommendations suggestions, etc., at that time and may make adjustments to the final composition grade if needed. The juries for this semester are scheduled for Friday, April 26 between 1:00 and 3:00 in GL 535.

Grading for the course is as follows:

Completion of satisfactory work as listed above under the projects and assignments section will result in a grade of A. Completion of less than the required work and/or unsatisfactory compositions, as determined by the instructor, will result in a lower grade based on the amount of work completed. Less than 5 minutes of acceptable music will result in a grade lower than a B (course will not count towards the comp major). On time attendance at all lessons is required. In addition, students should demonstrate that they are spending an appropriate amount of time on the materials, etc., discussed at each lesson so as to insure the completion of the required composition(s). Failure to do either may result in the lowering of the final grade at the discretion of the instructor.
