## ORCHESTRATION MUT 4311

<u>Course Description and Objectives:</u> This course is designed to introduce students to basic instrumentation and techniques of scoring for orchestral and other related instruments. Furthermore it will require that students synthesize and integrate the knowledge obtained in music history, music theory/sight singing, music technology, as well as applied classes and ensembles with the information presented, practiced and discussed in the class. Orchestration, as with most subjects is not an isolated area of study.

**Required Text:** The Study of Orchestration, by Samuel Adler, W.W. Norton (third edition); the accompanying workbook and CDs are optional. The textbook is available in the bookstore. Please note that the text is designed as part of a 2-semester sequence and as a result not all of the text will be utilized. It will however serve as both a textbook and a reference tool for the class.

<u>Materials to be covered:</u> (1) Basic instrumentation (transposition ranges, acoustics, capabilities of instruments, etc.); (2) Calligraphy and Notation; (3) Arranging, Transcribing, Composing, Performance practices, Analysis and (4) Introduction to the orchestration utilized in selected works from the repertoire.

**Format:** The format for the course will consist of lectures, discussions, and performances. Important note: It is vital that students take clear and concise notes in class. Good note taking and the studying of these notes and doing the readings will lead to success in the course. Please note that the lectures will move at a relatively fast pace and that for every hour in class at least 2 hours of work outside of class should be expected.

**Prerequisites:** Only music majors who have successfully completed all Freshman and Sophomore Theory and Ear Training/Sight Singing coursework are eligible for this course (no exceptions). Students who have completed these courses at other institutions must have successfully passed all levels of the Freshman/Sophomore transfer student placement theory/ear training/sight singing test or retaken and passed the course(s) at FIU in order to be permitted in this class. As mentioned above the skills obtained in these prerequisite (and other music) classes are essential in order to understand and be successful in this course. Note: it is strongly recommended that students either complete the MIDI Technology course required of music majors or become proficient with acceptable notation software prior to taking this course since all projects must be completed on this software. Please see me if you have the slightest question.

<u>Unit Tests</u>: There will be 4 unit tests given throughout the semester. The 1st will be given on September 29, the 2nd on October 15, the 3rd on November 5 and the 4th on November 19. Please note that <u>no makeup unit tests will be given unless a student has a verifiable medical or verifiable personal excuse</u>. The tests will include materials from the lectures and readings up to the point they are given. Unit tests include fill in the blanks, definitions, matching, analysis, short answers, etc. The average score of the 4 unit tests is worth 15% of the total grade for the course.

**Final Exam:** There will be a Final Exam worth 35% of the total grade for the course to be administered in December on the date and time specified by the university in the fall semester schedule. The exam may include fill in the blanks, definitions, matching, analysis, short answers, etc. Materials <u>from the lectures</u> as well as from assigned readings will make up this <u>comprehensive test</u>. <u>No makeup final exam will be given unless a student has a verifiable medical or verifiable and legitimate personal excuse</u>.

**<u>Readings from the text:</u>** Readings from the text are assigned per the attached schedule and are required (not optional). The unit tests/exams include text materials not discussed in class. Study Guide questions specifying the materials from the readings that will be on the tests/exams will be provided before each test.

**Projects:** There will be 2 orchestration projects due throughout the semester.

(1) The first project is worth 15% of the total grade in the course and consists of a short classical/romantic scoring exercise (24 measures) for strings and woodwind(s). Due October 1.
(2) The second project is a similar exercise in a 20<sup>th</sup> century idiom (32 measures) worth 25% of the total grade in the courses, scored for strings, winds, and percussion. Due November 24.

All projects must be performed in class and parts and an analysis of the work will be required. More detailed information regarding each project will be handed out in class before each project is due. Critiques/Analysis of the projects presented in class are also required and will be completed in class during the reading sessions (as a result attendance at the reading sessions is mandatory). These critiques will be worth a total of 10% of <u>each project grade</u> (and graded as pass fail). Guidelines will be given out in class.

**Participation in Groups:** At the beginning of the semester students will be placed in groups by the instructor. There will be 4 sessions throughout the semester in which the student groups will meet during the first part of the class to discuss and formulate answers to questions given to them by the instructor during the prior period. The questions for each session will be based on the readings and previous class lectures. Each group will present their results to the rest of the class during the second part of the same period. At the end of the period, students will grade each of the students in their own group for their effort as well as the collective efforts of the other groups based on the work and presentations.

As a result half of each student's participation grade will be based on the grade given for the groups' participation as a whole and the other half on the grade given by the other members of the student's group to the individuals in the group for their individual effort. The average grade for these sessions will be worth 10% of the total grade for the class. Please note that failure to attend class sessions in which group sessions are taking place will result in the student receiving a 0% for that session (note there is no way to make up this grade). In addition, arriving late will lower the session grade by 1 point per minute late, while arriving after the discussion begins will result in a 0% grade for the session. The dates for these sessions are 9/24, 10/13, 11/3, and 11/17.

**Due Dates and turning in projects:** An important part of the class is to prepare students for their future careers in the professional music world. This means that due dates are treated as deadlines in professional situations. As a result late projects are penalized. More specific details regarding this policy will be supplied when each project is assigned.

Attendance: The total grade in this course is not solely based on test/exam scores but a combination of test/exam scores, and on time attendance and participation. Failure to attend lectures, be on time, and participate in class discussions will result in a lowering of the final grade at the discretion of the instructor and as follows: after 3 unexcused class period absences a full letter grade reduction of the final grade will result for each subsequent unexcused absence. Excused absences must be documented and only include health related absences and situations beyond the students control (e.g. car accidents, etc).
